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Sermon title: "Then they shall know that I am the LORD" (Ezekiel 34:26-28).

Good morning. As I warned last week, I'm sticking with the prophet Ezekiel again today. For reasons I'll explain later, I'm not going to apply Ezekiel's teachings to Hurricane Ida, to the pandemic, or to Afghanistan, but I have to acknowledge that these things are still on my mind, and still at the center of many of our prayers.

[SLIDE 1] I will make them [the Israelites] and the region around my hill a blessing; and I will send down the showers in their season; they shall be showers of blessing. The trees of the field shall yield their fruit, and the earth shall yield its increase. They shall be secure on their soil; and they shall know that I am the Lord, when I break the bars of their yoke, and save them from the hands of those who enslaved them.

[SLIDE 2] They shall no more be plunder for the nations, nor shall the animals of the land devour them; they shall live in safety, and no one shall make them afraid.

My first title for this sermon was: "Don't say I didn't warn you." Here's why: my own personal controversy with Ezekiel is his constant use of this so-called "acknowledgment formula": "Then they (or you) shall know that I am the LORD." [SLIDE 3]

The specific instance that's linked to the title of my sermon, Ezekiel 34:26-28, comes from the happy ending of Ezekiel 34, the chapter I dealt with last week. After dethroning the corrupt shepherds and warning the bullies and polluters among the sheep, Ezekiel reports that God has taken over directly, and will put David on the throne to represent God.

But this is one of the relatively few times Ezekiel uses this phrase in a happy context.

For example, in Chapter 6, Ezekiel uses it *four times*, in his indictment of Israel and his warning of what their punishment will be like. For example:

[SLIDE 4] Verse 10: And they shall know that I am the Lord; I did not threaten in vain to bring this disaster upon them.. Verses 14 and 15, I will stretch out my hand against them, and make the land desolate and waste, throughout all their settlements, from the wilderness to Riblah.[b] Then they shall know that I am the Lord.

It would be too depressing to list all of the times this formula is repeated, but as you can see, **[SLIDE 5]** I've made a start. Here are the 58 times he repeats it. (If anyone

would like to see the details, I can send you a list with hyperlinks to the biblical texts.)

Of those 58 times, **[SLIDE 6]** I'd count ten of them as good news, relating to God's promise to restore Israel as in Chapter 34. The other 48 basically say, "I'm going to rain destruction down on you -- then you'll really know who I am."

And of course it's not just Israel who is threatened with this fate, as in chapter 6. For one specific example, one of Ezekiel's pet grievances is that the rump leadership of Judah under Babylonian occupation is conniving with Egypt to create a coalition against Babylon, despite God's orders to the Israelites to cooperate with their conquerors. In chapters 29 through 33, Ezekiel pronounces savage judgments against Egypt, not just for its conspiracies with Judah's plotters, but for its arrogance.

Maybe you can understand my discomfort with the way Ezekiel portrays God. It's almost as if Ezekiel is like an angry mom from a 1950's TV show, saying to the naughty child, "Just wait until your daddy gets home -- he'll show you what's what." Is this what our Creator, who loved us into being, is really like?

Some of you may remember me speaking last January on Noah's ark. One thing I didn't mention was the biggest discomfort I have with *that* story: the wiping out of countless innocents. It's also the reason I can't sing "Pharaoh's army got drownded, O Mary don't you weep." It's a theme that I call "God's collateral damage," the apparent suffering among innocent people and animals seemingly caused by God's mighty acts. There seem to be three ways out. Which way do you prefer?

- 1. These people's sufferings were inconsequential to God in comparison to the value of teaching the rest of God's audience a lesson.
- 2. These events did not happen exactly as they're prophesied or depicted in the Bible; in reality, while many innocent people suffered and died in biblical history, no innocent people suffered just for the sake of shock and awe.
- 3. God's biblical chroniclers did not understand God well enough at that point in history to record God's provisions of care to those whose death appears cruel to us. Along with the Creator we know and love, there's a residue of the tribal God, the warrior God of the Israelites, whose prominence seems to vary dramatically from one biblical writer to another. What's really interesting to me is that the biblical editors, both at the time, and in the centuries when the Bible was being put together by church committees, did not think this variety should be concealed from us, and trusted that the Holy Spirit would help us discern what we need to know about God's character.

If you were here last Sunday, you heard me call Ezekiel, the priest-prophet of Israel's Babylonian exile, a political scientist. At the time of his prophecies, the air was certainly thick with politics. Just a quick review of the context: Around four centuries before Ezekiel, the last king of the complete nation of Israel, King Solomon, started out his reign with lots of promise, but then began to allow the spiritual influences of other religions into Israel, and things went rapidly downhill from there.

According to the biblical record, when Solomon died, most of Israel rejected the rule of his successors, leaving those successors to rule a much smaller nation, Judah. Much of the political history of both parts, Israel and Judah, concerns their wars with each other and with neighbors, some of whom eventually conquer and take over both Israel and, eventually, Judah. The job of the prophets is very political: to address those events, including the cycles of corruption and reform, directly in the name of God.

In general, the prophets were not writing for the convenience of future preachers. Joseph Blenkinsopp's wonderful Interpretation commentary on Ezekiel warns us: 'It is important to bear in mind that the prophet, unlike the mystic, is addressing a quite specific historical situation, generally a situation of crisis. To approach a prophetic book with the idea that it will impart "timeless truths" is to risk serious misunderstanding.' Nevertheless, I'm going to risk it.

The biblical prophets focus mostly on three themes: first, the worship of God and the need to keep God at the center, no matter what. Often this theme is linked with their personal stories of how God commissioned them as prophets. Second, they point to corruption and its consequences, no matter whose ox is gored. The third theme: what will happen to Israel's neighbors as a result of their cruel treatment of the Hebrew people.

Ezekiel hit all of those themes hard, addressing very specific situations both before and after the fall of Jerusalem to the Babylonians in 586 BC. To risk extracting "timeless truths" from all of this passionate prophecy, here's what I propose for us today:

Ezekiel wants you to know that God can be worshipped even in exile, even when you don't have a temple to resort to. No matter what crisis we might be facing -- hurricanes, pandemics, blowback in our nation's foreign adventures -- God wants to be among us in our worship.

Second, Ezekiel wants you to know that God will not be mocked. It's an equal opportunity warning: God will not be mocked neither by our friends and allies, nor by our so-called enemies. What constitutes mocking God in our own time? Here are a couple of ways, but you might think of more... Christians mock God when we use manipulative God-language to fulfill our own agendas, in effect committing the one unforgivable sin: attributing to the Holy Spirit our own sinful intentions or prejudices. Then there's the most popular violation of the Ten Commandments in our politicized and polarized times: bearing false witness. God knows the truth, and will not be mocked.

Finally, Ezekiel wants us to know that God will, one way or another, keep God's promises. Drawing on Second Corinthians 1:20, here's another way to put it: Jesus is the "yes" to all of God's promises. Discerning how to express those promises to our community and our world today, and what our role is as the body of Christ in fulfilling them, might be Ezekiel's charge to us Quakers.

Then they shall know who God is!

The Message

30-31 "I've had it with the 'prophets' who get all their sermons secondhand from each other. Yes, I've had it with them. They make up stuff and then pretend it's a real sermon.

32 "Oh yes, I've had it with the prophets who preach the lies they dream up, spreading them all over the country, ruining the lives of my people with their cheap and reckless lies.

"I never sent these prophets, never authorized a single one of them. They do nothing for this people—*nothing*!" God's Decree.
